Mission Statement

The Mission Statement was read by Kaitlin Cartoccio. Reports

Somerset County Alliance Coordinator - (Stephanie Billitz)

• Submitting MA plans soon and don't foresee a lot of changes. Waiting on Q2 report which Kaitlin will forward asap.

Youth Services Commission – (Monica Sprague)

• The RFP competitive grant is for new innovative pilot programs or to expand existing programs in amount of \$3K-\$12K

Community Program Coordinator – (Kaitlin Cartoccio)

• Annual Grant of about \$5K for youth programs liking Viking, REACH, Grab and Go programs. If there are any ideas for youth services, please bring them to Kaitlin to apply. Competitive grant programs are the ones that can launch a program and then there are other ways to keep them going. Monica Sprague commented that Bernards Township has been a model for assessing needs in the community and finding creative programs that engage our youth. Other examples of programs: RISE (Reaching, Inspiring, Supporting Each other) at WAMS - students meet 2x's/ month with youth counselor focusing on Kindness/ Drug & Vaping Presentation/ Respect initiatives; student led initiatives; creative corner in media center (bean bag chairs, light filters, iPod for music in the am); Kindness challenge; 8th grade run meetings for 6th graders. Lucy Forgione suggested a program for the elementary schools? Catherine Saintaiti mentioned she could make connection with student counsel to support them. Kaitlin closed out the discussion mentioning it would have to be for identified to provide programming for "at risk" youth and must be ongoing. Will send out email with details including qualifying programming.

2. Youth Services Program Updates

REACH (Ridge Education Action & Community Health).

- a. Working on newsletter "outREACH" Focus on Drug Use, Mental Health, LGBTQ+, Environment).
- b. Making sure website is fresh and up to date.
- c. Grab and Go Teen Outreach Feb was bath balms; No bags for March Next bag is focused on stress relief around college entrance exams. Pick up April 13 and 14; May will be coordinated with Earth Day possible "decorate a reusable bag"; Hoping to bring it back in person as time goes on activities in the park; movie nights, etc. In 2023 when grant runs out, there may be money in the library budget to continue this program in some way.

3. <u>Upcoming Programs</u>

- LMTI Camp (https://njlmti.org/) will be in person. Aug 22 26 at Camp Mason. YACS go up a day early; At this point, all participants must be vaccinated, and have a neg COVID test 48 hrs. prior to arriving.
 - Email went out yesterday for nominations for REACH members to attend as a camper/ participant; also, YAC (Youth Advisory Council) - previously attended LMTI and will attend this year in a leadership position. CATS - College Aged attendees
 - Usually, 15 eighth grade students per team at middle school will be nominated for LMTI; looking for a variety of leaders with different strengths. Kaitlyn sends a letter to those nominated to attend an information session. Grant money is available to provide about 10 students \$250 partial scholarship as needed to offset their cost: 3 full scholarships available for those in need.
 - If there is a student who is not nominated but would like to attend, they or parent should reach out and we can work on getting them signed up
 - o Would take up to 30 students including YACs.
 - o (MJ) Favorite program we do!

- o Having 3-fold brochure
- Early bird registration until May 1 (\$20); May 2 Race Day \$25;
 Race Day \$30; \$15 for the 1-mile health walk; Registrants and volunteers get t-shirts; no swag bags; no donations accepted.

- Update on RACE to be Human that ran on February 24th 7pm
 Excellent presentation and discussion; covered a lot and defined a lot; used all different ages and backgrounds; great response from those in group that attended. Interest in overall response and attendance as well as township attendance.
- Bernards Township School District Pride Survey
 The PRIDE was administered in December to Bernards Township 6th, 8th, 10th, and 12th grade students. Response rate was very low due to some confusion surrounding the survey and the COVID-19 Omicron surge. The survey will be readministered in the next school year.
- Hope & Healing Support programs Resiliency Workshops
 Family Support Services in Camden offers statewide resiliency
 workshops through the FEMA Hope & Healing Support programs. Can
 offer resiliency workshops to teens and adults. Hoping to partner with
 the schools. Can also provide resources for seniors.
- LGBTQ ATOD Prevention Programs Partners in Prevention/Lindsey Meyer Teen Institute
 Monies have been encumbered to provide LGBTQ ATOD Trainings to REACH students and a community-wide workshop.

4.Subcommittee Discussion

Colin Lochner and MJ Postal are interested in senior mental health; do we want a formal mental health fundraising committee? Are there any county or township initiatives for seniors for Silver/ amber alerts?

Lucy Forgione commented that the Health Department has relationship with local senior centers; but not Municipal Alliance specific, Health Department monitors all infectious disease outbreaks not exclusive to COVID; close working relationship with Ridge Oak and VNA Nutrition Site; BTPD has intervention response for silver alerts;

Colin Lochner is interested in outreach for seniors that are isolated; MJ Postal brought up the Office on Aging is a county program that organizes volunteers to help seniors living on their own. The County Mental Health Board - Dial 988 for mental health first aid (https://suicidepreventionlifeline.org/current-events/the-lifeline-and-988/)

Robert Green mentioned that the clergy often keep list of people in need to be checking on.

Lucy Forgione commented that Peapack/ Gladstone has a model that they do wellness checks on seniors. Group agreed that looking into that model would be a good idea, but we would need someone in the group to take the lead on this type of effort.
