



New Jersey voters, let's bust through some myths you've heard and discover the truth about voting in the November 3, 2020 General Election.

HERE ARE THE FACTS:

 You **CAN** return your completed vote-by-mail ballot to your polling place.

Return your *completed* vote-by-mail ballot to your designated polling location, between 6:00 a.m. and 8:00 p.m. on Election Day, November 3.

Those voters who cannot locate their vote-by-mail ballot, or did not receive one, will be given a provisional paper ballot. After every vote-by-mail ballot is counted, all provisional ballots are then reviewed and matched to the voters' names before counting, in order to confirm that only one ballot per person has been submitted.

Voters with disabilities that prevent them from voting on a paper ballot can use an accessible voting device.

 Your vote **IS** kept secret.

Whichever way you cast your ballot, multiple safeguards are in place to maintain your privacy during the validation and counting processes.

 **EVERY** valid ballot is counted.

Each ballot determined to be valid will be counted, as long as it's postmarked, received or cast by 8:00 p.m. on November 3. For vote-by-mail ballots, just remember to vote, sign, seal and return your ballot according to the instructions. Valid provisional ballots are always counted, too—and not just in a close race.

 You **CAN** track your ballot.

Visit **Vote.NJ.Gov** and use the Track My Ballot tool to track your vote-by-mail ballot.

 You can only vote **ONCE**.

Voting more than once, or in someone else's name, is a crime punishable by law that results in strict penalties. A number of safeguards prevent fraudulent voting, ensuring that each person has only voted once and that the ballot is valid.
